I love basketball. Didn't play it much until seventh grade (except in the house with my sisters who were breaking mother's dishes and blaming it on me). But then I started playing.

I played on all kinds of teams – school, church, city, intramural, whatever. Even walked onto my college team for a month until I realized my future wasn't there. No NBA for me.

The basketball games I really enjoyed were all those I played after school with my friends. We would go to Donnie's house and play on his driveway for hours. Or I would go and play in the community centers in Nashville, especially Shelby Park. Walk in with a leather ball under my arm. "I got next". Play until you lose. Same thing in college at the school gyms or courts.

In the summer, I worked several years at Shelby Park. I would volunteer to watch the gym every afternoon. Then play basketball for hours in the not air conditioned gym. Your Nashville tax dollars at work.

And I enjoyed playing in my backyard. My daddy had found two long steel pipes and an old piece of plywood. He added a rim and net, dug the holes and put the basket up right on the edge of our backyard in the only flat spot of any size. If I missed long, the ball would bounce back to me from the back yard of the rental house next to us. I loved going out in the yard and just shooting by myself. Those two spotlights that just barely got any light on the goal. I would shoot right hand layups, then left hand (left hand, left side). Free throws. And play games against myself. Around the World. Horse. 21. Shoot. Get the rebound. Take the short shot. Again. Over and over.

I think that I was playing 21 that afternoon in the spring of my eighth grade year. I made my long shot, got the ball, hit the layup, then stopped. Put the ball under my arm. A teen age girl had run up the steps of the rental house. The new family just moved in. And she waved really big at me and said, "Hi, Chilly." Then she put her hand over her mouth realizing that I was not Chilly. She ran inside very fast, and I did not see her again for a month. I just stood there puzzled at the strange girl who had moved in. The kinda cute girl. After about ten seconds when she did not reappear, I dribbled the ball back out to the free throw line.

And that's the first time I ever saw Gloria. I would love to tell you that it was love at first sight. It was more confusion at first sight for me and embarrassment for her. As I dribbled, I did not understand that my life was changed forever. I did not comprehend that the new girl, the cute girl with the dimples, would be my Lady, my Love. That she would be more important to me than basketball. Or my friends. Or my family. That I would love her so much and she would love me so much that it makes the opening sentence of this story silly. Gloria is what love is.

It would be three years before we had our first date (to a church service). We would date for five years and three months as we finished high school and went away to college. I graduated on a Saturday. We got married on Sunday. And this August 30, we will celebrate our 44th anniversary.

Gloria, I love you. Thank you for getting over your embarrassment. And looking beyond a sweaty teenage boy playing basketball to see someone you could love and want to spend your life with. I know that I am very fortunate – that "many men have good wives, but I have the best of all".

Gloria and I would tell you that we both know we are fortunate to have each other all these years. And that the main reason we are so in love is that we both try very hard to love Jesus more than we love each other. Jesus will always have first place in both our lives. And then He shows us how to love each other even more. That's called a Christian marriage. It is God who has made us one. Gloria really does complete me.

We would also tell you that we don't believe in love at first sight. But we do believe in God's grace. And His plan for our lives. He made us for each other. When Gloria waved at me, God smiled. He knew what was coming and it made Him happy for us.

I played basketball at that goal for five more years before my family moved. I don't think that I ever again looked at the goal without seeing the house behind it and thinking about the girl that lived in it. Wondering – is she watching? Does she see me? I love you, Gloria. Happy Anniversary.

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Seeing and being seen: a devotional for a new school year

One of the things that summer does for us in the education profession is to restore our sight. We can easily lose our perspective as we near the end of the year – it is a challenge just staying focused as the tasks mount up. Summer gives us time to reflect – to see into the future, to look back, to see through some past problems/people, to soul search about any "blind spots" and "logs" (see Matthew 7:5) and to "look into" things that help us gain our balance and give us new hopes and dreams.

At the beginning of a new year, I encourage you to think about seeing. Will you take the time to truly see your students, parents, and colleagues and enter into their worlds? Will you recognize Jesus when he shows up in your school? Are you seeing the good or the bad in others? It likely depends on where you are focusing. Are we seeing beauty all around? It is essential that we help students see it, as beauty engages us and entices us to learn more – beauty is critical to the learning process. Will you take the time to see the needs of the world around you and through your keen sight provoke the missional imaginations of your students – to help them truly see as Jesus saw? Do you have a vision for the future impact, the ways God can use, each of those whose hearts and lives you have the opportunity to deeply impact?

At the beginning of the year, I encourage you to think about being seen. Not in the showy, attention-getting way that we first think about when we use the words "being seen." Let me give you an example of what I mean. In his wonderful book, **Nudge**, Leonard Sweet tells this story.

Many decades ago some men were panning for gold in the state of Montana. The prospectors organized themselves into an informal cooperative and agreed up front that if they should strike gold they would tell no one about their find.

After weeks of hard panning and digging, one of them found an unusual stone. Breaking it open, they were excited to see that it contained gold. Soon the prospectors discovered an abundance of the precious metal. They began shouting "We've found it! We've found gold! We've struck it rich!"

They then proceeded to go to a nearby town for additional supplies. Before leaving camp, they reminded each other of the pledge of absolute secrecy. While they were in town, none of them breathed a word about their good fortune. However, when they were getting ready to return to camp, they were horrified to discover several hundred of the local townsmen preparing to follow them. And when they asked who had revealed the secret of their discovery, the answer came: "No one had to. Your faces showed it."

How do you wish to be seen this year? What will students, colleagues, and parents see in you?
