Sunday Morning Worship Tell Me the Story of Elijah Tell Me the Story of the Church Most tourist groups who go to Israel visit the ruins of Caesarea. It is a very impressive place. It was built as a port on the Mediterranean Sea by Herod the Great. It was also built as a city that was an outpost of Rome, a city that had Roman style buildings and temples to Roman gods. It was, for Roman rulers and soldiers, a "Little Rome", a place where they could feel at home in a foreign country.

There was a hippodrome for horse racing and other athletic events. There was an amphitheater that still stands and is used today. You can sit in 2,000 year old seats and watch plays with the ocean as a backdrop. There were markets and homes. And there was Herod's home, his palace on the sea. It had its own docks and an indoor pool. It was a place where he could entertain important guests and impress them with his wealth and power.

After Herod died, his palace became the living quarters for the Roman governor. Caesarea was the main entry point to Israel for Roman troops and administrators. It shouted the power and strength of Rome to all who came there. A place that was overwhelmingly impressive to everyone.

Well, almost everyone. Romans 23:33 tells us that Paul was brought there and kept there under guard in Herod's palace. He was kept under guard for two years. He appeared before several Roman rulers. Talk about a contest between church and state! Then he left there and sailed to Rome to stand trial before Caesar.

I think often about that palace and the people living there. Paul appeared to be an unimportant prisoner who was little more that a Jewish preacher who was causing trouble for the Jewish authorities. No one there could have thought that anyone would ever remember him. And yet, he is regarded today as one of the most important people who ever lived. And the Roman rulers are remembered primarily (or only) because Paul appeared before them.

It is just something for you to think about in this election year. When you are tempted to be overly involved in politics. The Kingdom of God remains more important than every politician in Alabama. And the Church makes a real mistake when we trust those politicians and not Jesus.
