#### From John....

It was a pup tent that was like the Taj Mahal. To a ten year old boy.

It was beautiful army green. An inverted V shape. A closed back and an open front (flaps that did not really close – all mosquitoes welcome). Held up by two wooden poles and held down by seven plastic stakes. Head room – almost none. It had a thin bottom that was guaranteed to leak if you tried to camp out in the rain.

Capacity – two ten-year olds or zero adults. Padding on the bottom provided by three old quilts, a hundred comic books, three board games and the remains of whatever non healthy food we managed to sneak out of our houses. Lighting came from our dads' flashlights with rapidly dying batteries and a few candles. Aroma from our tenny shoes made damp by the dew and left just outside the tent.

Doesn't that sound like the Taj Mahal to you? Five star accommodations. With included activities that went beyond Monopoly and reading comic books. Just outside the tent we could play lots of games that became much more dangerous in the dark (and so more fun). So we wandered around the back yard (have you ever played croquet in the dark?).

But mostly we just stayed in the tent. We had been warned by parents that if we wanted to camp out we needed to stay out all night. And not be too noisy (meaning don't keep them awake). And to leave the back lights off (no wasting electricity). They did leave the back door unlocked.

They needn't have worried. We rejoiced at being away from them. Total freedom. Within sight of my back door. We were busy being boys. Boys camping. Really roughing it. We told stories. Giggled. Played games. Giggled (but not so loud that it bothered my parents). If we had realized that there were children around the world who did not get to camp out, we would have felt very sorry for them. If you had told us that many children would not want to camp out, we would not have believed you (except, of course, for the half of the world's children that we had no use for – girls). We felt like we would have nights to camp out forever.

As the night wore on and the batteries got dimmer, we would eventually go to sleep. On the quilts under an old sheet. With Monopoly pieces poking into our backs. We slept the sleep of the innocent (or at least the sleep of the not all that guilty). We did not sleep late. As soon as the sun began to come up, so did we. We played another game or two. And then my friend (usually my neighbor Charles) went home where his parents had left his back door unlocked, and I quietly went into my house. To my room. And my bed.

I loved those camping out in the back yard nights. I do not remember what happened to the tent. I do remember it got worn places on the walls, torn places in the floor, rips near where the poles met the roof. Maybe my mother threw it away. Maybe it just got so worn that it blew away.

I just know there came a day when it was gone. About the time sleeping in the back yard lost a lot of its appeal. Childhood is like that.

And so is life. Did you know that the Bible describes life here as like living in a tent? Temporary. And given to wearing out. It says that our bodies are like tents that will be destroyed. But God has a building waiting on us. An eternal home. One day we will be so worn out we will just leave our tent here on earth and go through the door into heaven. God will leave the door open for us. You know – the door that Jesus unlocked. He'll be the one at the door with his arms open to hug you and will say, "welcome home".

You can read about this in II Corinthians 5:1-10. This passage was on my mind after going to several funerals recently. We bury the old, worn out tent (the body) and move on to a new body and a new home. And then the things of this world will make it seem like we were just camping out.

# **How Did We Do on Missions Offerings During the Fall?**

- 1. World Hunger Relief \$475 Since September 1
- 2. Operation Christmas Child our church gave 30 boxes that went to children in the Dominican Republic.
- 3. Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for International Missions Our church goal for 2013 was \$3400. \$3500 was given as of January 11, 2014. We also learned that our church received an award for our giving to Lottie Moon in 2012. The reward goes to about 1/8 of Southern Baptist churches. It is based on the amount of giving per person in the congregation.
- 4. Typhoon Haiyan This giving was done on an individual basis by individual members.
- 5. The Giving Tree Many of you have faithfully kept the Giving Tree's branches stocked with food. We have been able to provide food to several families through this ministry.

6. Thanksgiving Food Boxes – The Ministerial Association carried about 32 boxes to families in Collinsville. Thank you for your donations.
