Lessons with Curtis Curtis is a Chocolate Lab. He is our son Joseph's best buddy and pal.

Last summer Joseph changed jobs and decided to stay with us for a few months until he settles into his new job. Curtis came with him. The new job is requiring a lot of hours away from here, so Gloria and I have stepped in to help with walking Curtis. It has been quite an adventure.

You have probably seen us around town. Curtis at the end of his leash, pulling hard. Always sure that we are either too slow or too fast. Gloria is better with him than me.

I had to learn that sometimes it is really important to get to the next clump of grass. And that it is very important to stop and put his hunting-dog-nose deep into the grass. He is certain that this time he will find something really important there. I am certain that he will not. After a while, I pull on the leash, and we move on again. Except when he suddenly turns back without warning and runs to look at something behind us. If I do not see this coming, the result is a huge jerk on the leash. And pain in my shoulder.

He is really smart. I left him in a room in the basement one day closing the door firmly. I came back later to find him out of the room. Turns out he knows how to open a door with his mouth and paws. One late night we were walking downtown. There had been a big rain, and the creek was way up. He ran over to the wall to look down into the creek. He almost jumped off to the water twenty feet below. He got excited. I looked. Yep. Lots of water. We continued our walk only after I pulled on the leash numerous times. He was unhappy.

On the late night walk, we usually walk up Main Street to the tracks, turn around and come back. As we approached the bridge again, he got excited again, rushing to the wall. We went back and forth along the wall. "Curtis, there is nothing there. Let's go home." Around the corner of the wall, straining at the leash. I was perturbed. "Let's go home." We moved over a few feet to hear a huge splash. There below us was a beaver who had hit the water with his tail as he swam away under the bridge.

Curtis and I froze. I looked over at him. He looked up at me and said, "See. I told you so. I would find lots of other animals if you would just let me off that leash." Okay, he did not say that. Out loud. But if you could have seen the look from those big brown eyes, you would have known that's what he was saying.

Gloria and I have come to love Curtis. And to appreciate much of our time with him. And we remain thankful for the love he gives Joseph. When Joseph is at home, Curtis makes it quite clear that he wants to be with Joseph, not us.

But Curtis and I continue to walk miles with each other. Sometimes, when we are away from most people, I will take him off the leash and let him run free. Down on the path by the creek where he can go get in the water. He is, after all, a Retriever, a water dog. Or along the tracks and through the park. Really nice time together.

Except. When Curtis sees another dog or an animal or a person, he is quite certain that he must confront. It is genetic right. On the leash or off, Curtis lunges for the other.

I yell at him. If on leash, I jerk back. If not, I scream louder. "No. Curtis, no." Over and over until he is back under control. Then I discipline some. Tell him he can't do that. He does understand – he is really smart. And he has gotten better.

Until the next time. Last night a cat ran right in front of him. My shoulder jerked out of socket. "No, Curtis. No."

I do get mad at him. I remind myself he was bred to be a hunting dog. To smell each blade of grass. And to chase all prey. Sometimes he glances at me quickly. Then chases anyway. It is bred into him. And he knows what he wants.

Or, as the world would say: The heart knows what the heart wants. Often said as an excuse for some sin. We live in a world that has elevated what a person feels in their heart as right. No matter what.

We Christians do not have that option. The Bible is clear about depending on the heart. "The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked." "Every imagination of the thoughts of man's hearts was only evil." "He that trusts in his heart is a fool." "For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies, pride, foolishness." That last sentence was spoken by Jesus. Gulp.

Part of why our country has such problem? People are trusting their evil hearts. Not God. A Christian web site recently had a picture of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden with this caption: "Couple Follows Their Hearts; Billions Dead".

Is there any hope? Sure. Human history did not end with Eden. And the heart can lead us to God. Emotions can be an important part of the Christian experience. If our hearts are changed. "Let us draw near with a *true heart* in full assurance of faith, having our *hearts sprinkled* from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water." "Pursue faith, love and peace, along with those who call on the Lord out of a pure *heart*."

When we let Jesus rule our hearts, they can become pure. We often tell people to invite Jesus into our hearts. When He enters, he cleanses. And our emotions lead to Him. Our hearts – evil. Our hearts belonging to Jesus – pure. Hope for us.

I'd like to stay and write some more. But it is almost time for Curtis's late night walk. Who knows what he will see tonight. Or what he will teach me.
